



Portugal's Parliament has approved a controversial new immigration law on July 16, 2025, which is now awaiting Presidential decision. The law significantly changes entry, stay, exit and removal of foreigners in Portugal, and has been met with both support and criticism from various political parties.



APPROVAL DATE

Approved on July 16, 2025, by the Portuguese Parliament

ACCELERATED PROCESS

Accelerated approval process of only 16 working days

PROCEDURAL CONCERNS


Criticized for lack of mandatory legal opinions and consultation

CURRENT STATUS

Now awaiting Presidential decision (20-day deadline)

SCOPE

Significantly changes entry, stay, exit and removal of foreigners



Key Changes



New Immigration
Unit (UNEF)

Creation of specialized police unit for immigration and border control.

Work Visas Restrictions

Limited to
"Highly Qualified"
professionals
only.

Family Reunification

Stricter rules for bringing family members to Portugal.

Reduced Visa Validity

New 6-month limit on visa duration.

^{*}These changes significantly impact CPLP citizens, including Brazilians, who previously had privileged access.

Controversy & Criticism



Procedural Concerns

- Rushed process only 16 working days
- Missing mandatory legal opinions
- No consultation with immigrant associations

Substantive Concerns

- Constitutional questions about family rights
- Economic impact on Portuguese labor market
- CPLP relations potentially damaged





Next Steps Presidential Options

Sign into Law

Law enters into force immediately

Political Veto

Returns to Parliament for revision

Constitutional Review

Sent to Constitutional Court







ECONOMIC IMPACT

Potential labor shortages in sectors reliant on immigrant workforce Shift toward highly qualified immigration only

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

Potential strain on CPLP relationships (Portuguese-speaking countries

SOCIAL IMPACT


Family separation due to stricter reunification rules
Potential increase in irregular immigration

LEGAL CONCERNS

Possible constitutional challenges regarding family rights
